WOMEN OF DISTINCTION

Service may be found by the eminent service contributing to Connecticut and may be found in, but not limited to, the following roles: civic, ecclesiastical, educational, commercial, and patriotic and prior to 5 July 1776. Reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Examples include:

Business owner: Women who owned or operated a socially acceptable and economically productive business which contributed to the economic and political development of Connecticut or obtained recognized and distinguished service in a profession or women leaders or pioneers contributing significant achievements in the colony of Connecticut such as: published authors, managers of proprietary affairs, apothecaries; blacksmiths; educators/teachers/school mistress; managers of land holdings/estates; midwife/healer; printers tavernkeepers; Those who fought oppression (considered on a case-by-case basis).
